## VISIT SOME OF L.A.'S HISTORIC MOVIE PALACES AND THEATRES WITH CURT TUCKER

Los Angeles is still blessed with some of the most remarkable movie theaters built during the Golden Age of Hollywood. On our “Last Remaining Seats Tour” we will take a nostalgic Journey as we visit some of the historic movie theaters of Los Angeles. We’ll explore the largest concentration of movie palaces left in the U.S., stretching for six blocks from 3rd Street to 9th Street along South Broadway. At its height, this neon-drenched district had the highest concentration of cinemas in the world, with seating capacity for more than 15,000 patrons. See the exteriors of the Million Dollar, The Los Angeles, The Palace, The Orpheum, and The Mayan. We’ll go inside the historic Tower Theatre which Apple has repurposed and converted into a gleaming triumph of historic preservation as an Apple Store. The project took nearly two years and required delicate restoration of lighting fixtures, coffered ceilings and soaring arched columns. From multi-tiered chandeliers that glitter diamond-like again to a meticulously restored stained-glass window glinting with the image of an old Hollywood film strip, Apple’s new L.A. flagship store on South Broadway was designed to reflect the creative spirit of the city around it. Another stop will be the Dolby Theater. Inspired by the elegance of a European opera house, with state-of-the-art technical capabilities, Dolby Theatre has been host to many of the world’s top performers and hosts high profile events such as America’s Got Talent, the American Idol finals, and of course the Academy Awards. Lastly, we will step off the red carpet and walk through the golden doors of Grauman’s Chinese Theater on our exclusive behind-the-scenes tour. Master showman Sid Grauman spared no expense when constructing his one-of-a-kind Chinese Theatre in 1927, importing stone figures, bells, pagodas, and sundry Chinese artifacts to give the venue a sense of extravagant grandeur. Along the way, we will also stop off to enjoy lunch on your own at Philippe’s. This L.A. icon has survived two world wars, the Great Depression, Prohibition, and the extension of the Hollywood Freeway in 1951. More importantly, it invented one of the tastiest variations of the humble sandwich in existence. When the owner – a French immigrant by the name of Philippe Mathieu – accidentally dropped a French roll in a pan of beef drippings. The delicious result was a hot, French dip sandwich. More than 100 years later after that delicious accident, the deli-style restaurant is still a Los Angeles tradition.
